What is WikiTree?

- Founded in 2008 by Chris Whitten
- Mission: to **connect the human family on one tree** that's free and accessible to everyone
- Designed to balance privacy and collaboration so that living people can connect on one world tree to common ancestors



What is WikiTree? (cont.)



- Privately collaborate with our close family members on modern family history and recent connections
 - Collaboration on deep ancestors is between distant cousins who are serious about genealogical research and careful about sources
 - Because all the profiles are connected on the same system our collaboration is creating a single family tree that will eventually connect us all and thereby make it free and easy for anyone to discover their roots
 - No "premium" memberships and nobody is charged for access to anything. Ever.
 - Those who actively help grow the tree must agree with the mission and Honour Code

Privacy vs. Collaboration

Privacy Level for Profile of Eowyn Langholf



-  Unlisted
No public information. Name won't appear in search results or directories. **Not an option for Wiki Genealogists.**
-  Private
Strictly limited public information. Only the Trusted List can view or edit the full profile.
The default for living people and non-living people when added as nuclear relatives of living people.
-  Private with Public Biography
Same as Private but anyone can view the biography section.
-  Private with Public Family Tree
Same as Private but anyone can view the family tree. Other individuals in the tree can still be private.
-  Private with Public Biography and Family Tree
Same as Private but anyone can view the biography and family tree.
-  Public
Anyone can view the full profile but only the Trusted List can edit it.
The default for non-living people under 200 years old except when added as nuclear relatives of living people. **Not an option for living people.**
-  Open
Anyone can view the full profile and any member who has signed the Wiki Genealogist Honor Code can edit it.
Required for people over 200. **Not an option for living people.**

Enter profiles by hand or upload a GEDCOM



- Entering by hand gives you the opportunity for a Genealogy do-over.
- Uploading a GEDCOM creates all your profiles with all information from your files included.



Importing a GEDCOM

- Before importing a GEDCOM make sure you have at least a birth date or a death date for every individual.
- After Importing a GEDCOM your files become a part of our big ole shared tree.
- The GEDCompare report shows close matches that were found between people in your file and existing profiles on WikiTree. Carefully review each suggested match to determine if it is indeed a match, if so it should be skipped. You should also skip people with Unknown or Living as their name.

Edward was born in Brookline, Massachusetts in 1885. It may have been August 28^[1] or 29.^[2]

The 1900 census (taken June 13) lists the 14-year-old Edward as living with his parents at 349 Summer St. in Fitchburg and doing Telegraph Messangrdry? (9 months unemployed?)

The 1910 census (taken April 24) lists the 24-year-old Edward as living with his parents at 96? Charles St. in Fitchburg and working as a railroad brakeman.

He married Effie on August 29, 1918 in Canning, Nova Scotia. See [Effie's page](#) for more about their life together.

He lived at 35 Brigham Park in [Fitchburg, Massachusetts](#). It was rented for \$28/month according to the 1930 census.

Edward worked for the Boston & Maine Railroad.

In 1928 he broke a leg after being thrown from the caboose of the train as it started.^[3]

He died at age 63. The [Whitten family bible](#) records the date as January 21, 1949.



With One Name Studies it is the *surname* that is of interest, rather than the family tree of members of the same family with several different surnames. It does involve many of the same research skills and techniques as family history, and most one-namers are actively researching both their own family and their one-name studv.



How to Get Started

- Talk to one of the project leaders and ask for a badge
- Add `one_name_studies` to your followed tags
- Contact current Study Coordinator or start your own if one doesn't exist

What To Do Once You're Set Up

1. Start by adding your one name study category to your profiles.
2. Look for other profiles with the same surname & post them to your study. These may be confined to a specific geographical area.
3. Invite members by the same name or who are researching the same name to join your study.
4. Add your surname origin and meaning to your study.
5. Add a table and post your yDNA results. Encourage other members to do the same so that closer comparisons can be made that will help you create your own yDNA signature.



What To Do Once You're Set Up

6. If you have DNA test results from other family members, add the tests along with links to their profiles.
7. Post your direct family line as a family unit & then invite others with the same surname to post their family line as a separate family unit, etc. In this case, the goal is to find a link between family units using traditional &/or DNA research. It would be especially helpful to outline profiles that show the results of your yDNA test.
8. Are there any famous notables by the same name? Add them to your study and encourage members to post their connections since they are usually proud of the connection and posting about it is discouraged on the notable's profile.
9. Add commentary for discussion. Who are your brickwalls? Are there any weak links that need more sources? Are there any interesting stories passed down through your family?

11. Add sources and resources. Are there any published books based on your surname with possible links? Historical societies in your geographical area of study that hold files on your surname? Family Historical Societies? Websites that are dedicated to your surname? Links for further research?

12. Advertise your study to other members via G2G & invite others to collaborate. Post updates on what is new or interesting in your project. The more we communicate on G2G about our projects, the better the One Name Studies Project will be.

Origins of the Templeton Name

There are several versions of how the name Templeton, with various spellings, came to be derived. Some might be true, or have some truth, and some may be simply romantic folklore.

One popular version states the name is associated with the Knights Templar. This version is derived from two sources. One source is based on the description of the paschal lamb on Templeton coat of arms which is stated to represent Christians who performed service in Holy Land during the crusades. The other source is based on combining two words. The French word "templier" has been translated as meaning Templar, as in Knights Templar. The second word is from the older Anglo-Saxon word "tun" which was corrupted to the Old English "ton," which means farm, hamlet or village. Combining the two, one comes up with Templeton – sort of. It seems the line was connected with the crusades in some manner but it does not necessarily mean any Templetons were Templars or that the name was derived from the Templars (additional information below).

A second version of the name derivation is more plausible. An Old English word "templ" meant a place of worship and it did not necessarily mean a place of Christian worship if in use prior to the growth of Christianity in the British Isles. Per the Oxford Dictionaries we have "Old English templ, temple reinforced in Middle English by Old French temple, both from Latin templum 'open or consecrated space.'" Add to this "tun" or "ton" we would get Templeton, Templetun, Templetoun, Templetoune, etc. This is a more logical explanation since surnames came about when taxing was introduced in England. The addition of a surname helped the tax collector distinguish between those whose given name was the same. The surname was usually taken from the name of a geographical feature or a hamlet, town, farm, village in the area where the individual lived. When we
